## **Foreword from the Headmaster**

This booklet, which is compiled towards the end of the academic year, aims to sum up the many achievements of Freeman's pupils during 2010-11. It is usually issued at Prize Day which is itself a celebration of our achievements during the year. The wide range of activities in which pupils participate and achieve high standards is well reflected in this booklet. The opportunities provided for pupils in so many different areas help to broaden their education in line with the Schools' 'whole person' philosophy. All of the extra-curricular programme is followed alongside the academic programme and compliments it; pupils' academic studies should never suffer because of their involvement in extra-curricular activities. A great deal of support from the teaching staff, visiting staff and coaches as well as from parents makes these achievements possible. We are very fortunate to have this level of commitment.

Public examination results in 2010 were of the same high standard as in previous years. At GCSE 81% of grades were either A\* or A and at A Level 89% of grades were either A or B. In 2010 the new A\* grade was introduced at A Level and 27% of entries achieved this grade. Public examination results are not an end in themselves but also determine higher education outcomes for students when they leave Freeman's. I am grateful to the academic staff whose patience and expertise have, alongside much hard work by pupils themselves, enabled the vast majority to go on to the universities and colleges of their choice. I am also grateful to Mr Martin Hearne, and the team of Sixth Form tutors whose hard work during 2009-2010 led to the higher education successes indicated in this booklet.

The successes of our pupils in both the Junior and Senior Schools on the sports' fields are included in detail in this booklet. The actual results speak for themselves but equally pleasing is the high standards of sportsmanship which the pupils display especially when they are away from the School and act as ambassadors – always well turned out and wanting to do their very best, sometimes against much larger schools. Again, the commitment of those who work with the pupils, week in week out, in rain or sunshine is undoubtedly one of the keys to their success. I compliment all of the sports staff and coaches under the direction of Mr Deighton and Miss Ridley for their leadership and commitment to this very important area of school life.

Music and Drama continue to thrive at Freeman's. The Music department has maintained an extensive programme of concerts throughout the year, some 30 in all. It has been a pleasure to meet many parents on these occasions and also to see the progress that the musicians are making from youngest to oldest.

The academic year began with the return production of *The Typhoid Marys* which the Drama Department had taken on a very successful tour to the Edinburgh Fringe. The department in addition to the regular studio productions for GCSE and A Level was also represented at the International Forum on Food and Nutrition in Milan in November 2010. Many parents will have enjoyed the performances two weeks before the end of term of *The Practical Princess* and *Nathan's Nightmare*. Mr Tong and the department have been as energetic and busy as ever during the year.

The many other societies and clubs including Debating, Young Enterprise and the Duke of Edinburgh's Award have listed their achievements in the booklet. There have been a large number of educational visits and trips including a very successful trip to Peru in the summer of 2010. All of these help to broaden the pupils' horizons.

Even a cursory reading of this booklet suggests that it can only be a snapshot of the achievements of junior and senior pupils during the 2010-11 academic year. We are very fortunate to have many talented pupils at Freeman's and it is wonderful that they are so often willing to use those talents in the service of others. The large amounts of money raised for charity, especially in the Junior School is perhaps the best testimony to this School's core ethos – well done and congratulations to everyone.

I hope you enjoy reading about the various activities and achievements of 2010-11; I have no doubt you will find them as impressive as I do.

- All Lower 6 Economics and Upper 6 Business Studies students had an opportunity to enter the Citizenship Foundation's 'Chance to be Chancellor' competition, in which they selected a number of possible budget policies to help restore the UK Economy, and wrote a speech justifying their choices
- Some Upper 6 Economics students entered the Chartered Institute of Taxation's 'Challenge the Chancellor' competition, in which they were required to devise an original taxation policy and write an article persuading the Chancellor of the Exchequer of its merits
- A series of internal Business and Economics essay competitions have been held, open to all those studying these subjects. Winners and runners up have received books and book tokens
- Upper 6 Business Studies students have conducted a culture and change management study in the 6th form on behalf of the school's Senior Management Team, and made recommendations to the SMT based on their findings
- A number of Lower 6 Economics students have entered the Royal Economics Society 'Young Economist of the Year' essay competition, a competition held by the Land Economy department of Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge, and the Quincentenary Prize essay competition of St John's College, Cambridge
- Lower 6 Business Studies students have conducted market research on behalf of the school at Open Mornings

- Lower 6 Economics students have conducted Consumer Confidence surveys at Open Mornings in support of the Upper 6 Economics team's research for Target 2.0 competition
- Visits to Eton College 'Keynes Society' and 'Entrepreneurship Society' to hear a range of speakers including Jonathan Warburton (Executive Chairman of Warburton's bakery), Stephen Hemsley (Executive Chairman of Dominoes Pizza UK), Professor Robert Skidelsky (Emeritus Professor of Political Economy at the University of Warwick and biographer of Keynes), John Ayton (Founder and CEO of Links of London jewellery), Rich Ricci (Co-Chief Executive of Barclays Capital and Co-Chief Executive of Corporate and Investment Banking) and Bill Winter (form CEO of JP Morgan and now one of four members of the UK's Independent Commission on Banking)

## **Drama**

- Once again the year has been a busy one for the Drama Department, and it has also been an incredibly successful one for many of our present and past students who left Freeman's to pursue the dream of a career in the professional theatre
- The year began with the return of our production of 'The Typhoid Marys' from the Edinburgh Fringe where we gained favourable press attention from 'The Times Educational Supplement' and BBC Radio 4 amongst others. The play told the story of the many women who were incarcerated for life in Long Grove Psychiatric Hospital, Epsom, for no better reason than they were carriers of Typhoid; this tragic story played to nearly full houses in Edinburgh and showcased our young actors at Freeman's

- A number of the cast of this show had been part of the group who had successfully performed a piece on 'young people as consumers in the internet age' at the global summit of 'The Consumer Good's Forum' in June 2010 at the QEII Centre in Westminster
- As a result of this performance the department was invited to create two bespoke pieces of theatre about food in a sustainable future for the Barilla International Forum on Food and Nutrition in Milan in November 2010. Six of the Upper 6 A2 Drama students were flown out to Milan for three days to present their work to an international audience; a wonderful experience for everyone involved
- In March these same A2 Drama students presented us with their original devised pieces of theatre
- 'Wires' saw Yiannis Charalambous, Charlotte Duke, Graeme du Plessis and Elise Wilkinson present one of the most imaginative and audacious pieces of physical theatre ever seen here at Freeman's
- This contrasted perfectly with 'To Build A Home', a piece that explored the tragedy of human trafficking in the UK; James Trinder, Ollie Hampden, Natasha Hicks, Vicky Wales and Becca Phillips wrote and performed a predominately naturalistic piece which, will live long in the memory as one of the best pieces of devised theatre ever seen at A Level
- Next up were the GCSE Drama shows. Over two nights these examination students shared four excellent shows: 'Saw It in the Papers', 'Sunday Morning at the Centre of the World', 'Beasts and Beauties' and 'Private Peaceful'. There were some outstanding performances in these four shows and we look forward to some strong results in the summer for these candidates
- The AS students presented their terrific interpretation of Stephen Berkoff's 'The Trial'. This was a real tour de force, and the visual spectacle was more than matched by some great ensemble work. Ricky Cooksey's performance as Joseph K and Sarah Moore's as Titorelli demonstrated what fine actors they have become
- The year ended with 'The Practical Princess', a musical production featuring some of the younger actors from Upper 3 to Lower 5. What this show proved is that the production line of great performers is still going on and many of this cast will grace our stages here at Freeman's for many years to come

- It has been a terrific year for our thespians in other ways too. Lawrence Belcher in Lower 5 capped a year where he performed at the National Theatre and the Donmar Warehouse, with a leading role in the *Doctor Who* Christmas Special and a role in the new *X Men* movie currently playing in cinemas
- Over the years we have had tremendous success in getting students into the National Youth Theatre but this year Daniel Sareen in Lower 5 has beaten all our records by becoming our youngest ever success. Daniel undertakes his training with the NYT this summer and then becomes eligible to be cast in NYT shows. This clever young actor will do very well indeed
- Next year looks equally exciting as we prepare for two shows in the Schools' Shakespeare Festival, a full school musical and a new show in Edinburgh in 2012. So much to see and so much to applaud!

- Hattie Knight, an A2 student last year, has gained a place at ALRA to undertake her professional actor training. James Trinder, who many will remember for his fabulous portrayal of Sweeney Todd is on the final call list at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama where he hopes to train as an actor

This project looks to find the best young theatre talent both here in the UK and in the US and give these professionals an opportunity to work in the other country. This will give Lucy's career just the lift it needs
- Caitlin Thorburn, who left in 2006, has worked solidly since leaving Manchester Metropolitan where she was the top actor graduate in her year. At present she has the lead in the World Premiere of Tennessee Williams' last play, 'A Cavalier for Milady' which is currently running in the West End. Watch this space – she will go far!
- Andrew Garfield goes from strength to strength, beating Colin Firth to best actor in the Evening Standard Film Awards for his work in *The Social Network* and *Never Let Me Go* and now with his new film role where he will play Peter Parker, aka Spider Man in the forthcoming prequel to the Hollywood series. And just think, it all began here with his performances in the Senior Assembly Hall.

- The Geography department continued its involvement in the school environmental society 'Leaf'
- University success continued. Millie Chapman and Jennie Williams both went to Oxford to read Geography. Sam Matthey and James McCann both went to university to read Geography
- Upper 3 visited Newhaven and Rottingdean for a coastal studies field day
- Lower 4 carried out a microclimate investigation in Ashted Park and then used a Geographic Information System (GIS) to analyse the results
- Upper 4 completed an Environmental Impact study on Box Hill, producing impressive projects of their findings
- The Lower 5 GCSE students visited Somerset and North Devon to study several geographical environments for the new IGCSE qualification
- Lower 6 studied the River Tillingbourne as well as rural and suburban settlements in the Mole Valley
- The Upper 6 visited Iceland to investigate geomorphological processes and tourism

## **History**

- Upper 3 Visit to Rochester Cathedral and Castle to investigate aspects of medieval religious life and warfare
- Lower 4 Visit to the Black Country Living Museum, Dudley, a reconstructed Victorian town. Students spent the day experiencing life in an industrial centre in the Midlands with a trip on a canal barge, a visit to a foundry and a walk into a drift mine being highlights

- A large number of Upper 5 students, along with historians from other years, visited New York City during February half term. The group visited Ground Zero, Ellis Island and enjoyed a walking tour of Harlem looking at sites related to the Civil Rights Movement
- Lower 6 students attending lectures on the reign of Henry VIII by academics including Ronald Hutton, Diarmaid MacCulloch and David Starkey
- A new trip to Hampton Court to visit Cardinal Wolsey and Henry VIII's remarkable palace
- Upper 6 have taken a lead in organising meetings of the Batchelor Society. There have been a variety of meetings including hearing Mrs. Brooks speak about life in Communist Czechoslovakia, Mr. Chadwick discussing Julius Caesar along with many other contributions from staff and students
- Five historians have received offers to continue their studies in the subject at university: Sam Dean (Nottingham), Laura Grayling (Sidney-Sussex College, Cambridge), Amelia Harman (Exeter College, Oxford), Francesca Scott (Leeds) and Katie Zinser (Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge)

## **Mathematics**

- Pupils from six year groups entered in National Maths Challenge competitions gaining 11 Gold Senior, 14 Gold Intermediate and 12 Gold Junior Certificates. Twelve pupils were subsequently invited to take part in follow-on rounds, with Masaaki Umemoto achieving a Merit on the Intermediate Olympiad and Rachel Dunne a Merit in the Grey Kangaroo Competition
- Upper 4 pupils enjoyed Orienteering, the Fairtrade Game, Making Mobiles and Origami during the Activities weeks
- Some Upper 4 and Lower 5 students completed three STEM challenges during Activities weeks, including a carousel of Maths Puzzles
- Four Key Stage 3 pupils took part in the National Team Maths Challenge in March
- Lower 6 students enjoyed taking part in the Surrey Maths Team Challenge, and the regional round of the UKMT Senior Team Maths Challenge
- A group of sixth formers attended the UKMT lecture at the Royal Institution
- Some Lower 6 students registered for Headstart pre-university taster courses in Mathematics and Engineering

- A number of pupils are intending to continue their mathematical studies at University; two at Oxbridge, one at Warwick, three at Imperial, one at Bath. In addition, a number will pursue maths based courses such as Accountancy and Finance (five in total, three at LSE and two at Bath) and nine engineers
- Mathematics has continued to be the most popular subject choice at AS and A Level, and there has been a significant increase in numbers studying Further Mathematics (currently 28 sixth formers). A new AS Further Mathematics course is being introduced into Upper 6 from 2011 to meet demand

### **Modern Languages**

- European Day of Languages was celebrated by the Junior School on Monday 27<sup>th</sup> September 2010. Pupils dressed up in costumes from around the world and took part in fun activities and a poster competition. Prizes were awarded for best costumes and posters
- The first ever Freeman's "Love Languages" competition was held on Monday 14<sup>th</sup> February 2011. The competition was themed around Love, and over 120 pupils from 12 schools across the South East attended Freeman's to perform a five minute piece in their chosen foreign language – either French, German or Spanish – in front of a panel of judges and live audience
- Lower 5 German and History residential visit to Berlin in July 2011. 30 pupils took part in this combined Language and History trip which will include visits to the Brandenburg Gate, the Reichstag, Sachsenhausen concentration camp, and the Jewish Museum
- Upper 4 and Lower 5 French exchange trip to Lyon in March 2011. 22 pupils participated in the exchange which enhanced both their language skills and their cultural awareness. The French exchange is set to become an annual event
- Upper 4 and Lower 5 trip to Salamanca in Spain. 32 pupils took part in this residential trip to Spain which combines language tuition with an exciting cultural programme. Pupils will have a guided tour of the main sights of Salamanca, a tapas tour, a film, salsa lessons and a full day's excursion to Segovia and the ancient walled city of Ávila. The trip provides an excellent opportunity for pupils to gain insight into the Spanish way of life and of course to practise the language
- Six language students took up places at university last year to study either a Modern or an Asian language at universities including Cambridge, Bristol, Exeter and Leeds

## **Music**

- Over 30 concerts, including Senior and Junior Concerts, Instrumental Concerts and Carol Services
- Camerata and Polyphony sang at the Guild of Freeman Christmas Carol Service at St Martin within Ludgate in the City
- The Seniors gave a Summer concert based on music from films, including a medley from Howard Shore's score for The Lord of the Rings
- Over 300 pupils participated in the House Music auditions and finals.
- 85 pupils passed their Associated Board Exam during the Autumn and Spring Terms. 9 pupils achieved a distinction, and 29 pupils passed with a merit
- Two pupils passed Rockscool Drum Kit exams with Merit – a first for Freeman's
- 18 pupils passed their Trinity Guildhall Exam during the Autumn and Spring Terms. Two pupils achieved distinction and eight pupils passed with merit
- Instrumentalists took part in a Practice-A-Thon in the Spring Term raising £500.70 for the CLIC Sargent charity
- Our brass players gave a joint concert at Freeman's with Surrey Brass in June
- Ellen Timothy and Samuel Strijdom are members of the National Youth Choir of Great Britain
- Peter Lam is a member of Stoneleigh Youth Orchestra
- Ellen Timothy was soprano soloist in Vivaldi's Gloria with Ashtead Choral Society
- The Senior African Drumming Ensemble performed in David Fanshawe's African Sanctus at St Martin's Church, Epsom
- Rebecca Baker performed Vaughan Williams' The Lark Ascending with the London Gala Orchestra at the Dorking Halls in April

## **Politics and Sociology**

- A student and staff *Question Time* in the Autumn Term saw Peter Hyams, Hannah Kent, Mr Daniel Rutherford and Mr James Brooke fielding questions in front of a large audience in the Haywood Centre. The panel and audience were ably handled by Chairperson Laura Grayling
- In September the Sixth Form Government and Politics students visited the Palace of Westminster. The trip included a tour of the Houses of Parliament as well as learning workshops organised by the United Kingdom Parliament Education Service
- In November the sixth form Government and Politics students were again enjoying a visit to Westminster, this time for a sixth form student conference. The day saw a range of activities including talks by the Speaker of the House John Bercow MP, the Labour MP David Lammy and the comedian Mark Thomas
- Upper School pupils also travelled to Westminster for a Lifestyle Choices Seminar in which they were invited to share their views on significant social questions and comment on government policy
- Mr Wright gave an assembly to the Sixth Form concerning the May referendum on Electoral Reform. This informed students about the nature of the vote and encouraged them to use their ballot
- Three of the seven students taking A2 Government and Politics are planning to go on to study the subject and related degrees at University. These students are Elena Artamonova (Roehampton), Lewis Main (Nottingham) and Elise Wilkinson (Leeds)

## **Psychology**

- Psychology continues to be a popular subject for university study, with several A2 students in 2010 going on to study psychology in higher education
- Many of the A2 students visited the Old Bailey and sat in on several cases as part of City Visit. As the Forensic Psychology module looks at different trial systems, the psychology of the courtroom and how a jury works, this trip provided an excellent opportunity for the students to see theory they had learnt in the classroom put into practice in real life

- Jessica Ball holds a place to read Veterinary Medicine in September 2011
- During the activities fortnight, Upper 3 and Lower 4 pupils took part in science fun days. They had to solve a crime using the chemistry of forensics, design and test an effective paper aeroplane and follow an ecology-based nature trail

- Upper 6 student, Martyn Holloway-Neville, was recognised as 'Best Chemist' by the Society of the Chemical Industry at a ceremony at Surrey University in November 2010
- Chemistry Olympiad 2011: two gold medals (Jason Ho and Tom Sneller), three silver medals (Trevor Cheung, Matthew English and Martyn Holloway-Neville) and two bronze medals (Marcus Leung and Mark Whitehouse)

## **Sixth Form Enrichment Programme**

- Freeman's new Sixth Form Enrichment Programme comprises four key elements which together demonstrate that students have achieved success in terms of A-levels and wider learning and enrichment activities
- The aim of this programme is to better prepare sixth formers for the demands of their university degree courses and beyond, by helping them to develop valuable critical thinking skills and expertise in research techniques and project management
- Alongside this they participate in a range of enrichment activities including music, art, drama and sport. They can also learn a new language, improve their culinary skills, DT and IT skills and gain life saving and first aid qualifications
- Students also have opportunities to be of service both within the school and in the wider community
- Students work towards an AQA Baccalaureate qualification which requires depth of study represented by A levels, breadth of study achieved through AS Critical Thinking, independent learning demonstrated through the completion of an Extended Project and enrichment activities for which a minimum of 100 hours needs to be recorded
- In Critical Thinking sessions pupils study the structure of arguments and learn skills useful in writing, research and public speaking
- The Extended Project qualification gives students an opportunity to carry out independent research into a topic of their own choosing and interest. AQA were so impressed with Loretta Chan's project, for which she investigated how the composer John Williams went about creating film music and had a go at writing some herself, they are now using it as exemplar material for teacher training

## **Young Enterprise**

- This year four companies were formed at Freeman's from students in the Lower 5 and Lower 6. They sold products ranging from towels and crystal Christmas trees to glow in the dark pyjamas!
- One group utilised their photographic skills to take and sell photographs at a variety of events including school balls and productions

- All companies produced 20 second YouTube adverts and took part in the Dragon's Den event and two training sessions hosted by Freeman's as well as attending the Exxon Mobile Christmas fair
- The school also held the area final in which 12 companies competed. Unfortunately Freeman's companies were not successful and proceeded no further in the competition
- The school was awarded a Centre of Excellence award by Young Enterprise at the area finals in May in recognition of the school's commitment to enterprise over a number of years
- The students who took part this year have learned a huge amount about communication, organisation and team working and it has been a genuine pleasure watching their personal growth

### **Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme**

The aim is to allow pupils to progress with 'manageable steps' that properly prepare them for the three levels of the award. As a consequence each expedition is a little harder than the last. The award is very popular at Freeman's

- **Bronze Award:** Almost all of Upper 4 have enrolled this year undertaking expeditions locally in the Surrey Hills area. The practice focuses on camp craft and basic navigation: the expedition takes place from Bocketts Farm car park – Bentley Copse Scout Campsite – Newlands Corner. The final expedition starts near Leith Hill – Ranmore Common Scout Campsite – Freeman's
- **Silver Award:** Half of Lower 5 have enrolled. The practice is a little harder again, focusing on micro navigation in the New Forest. The final expedition, again slightly more challenging, takes place in the Crickhowell area in the Black Mountains in Wales
- **Gold Award:** About 50 Sixth Form pupils are working towards their gold award. The practice expedition centres on Pen Y Fan and Cord du in the Brecon Beacons and the final is in the Black Mountain area. After two four day expeditions (approximately 72km each) pupils feel they really have achieved something worthwhile at this level

## **Charitable Activities**

Every September each section of the School chooses a charity to support. The emphasis is often on local charities, and this year is no different. Many are chosen on the basis of a personal experience that has brought a pupil or pupils in closer contact with the work of a particular charity. As ever, there have been a large number of fund-raising events; some edible, some not. A great deal of time, thought and effort has gone into dreaming up events that not only provide a good time for the participants but raise money and awareness too.

The charities supported this year are:

### **Wheels for the World (Junior School)**

This is a charity which restores and distributes wheelchairs to disabled people in other countries – mainly, but not exclusively, in Africa. Old NHS wheelchairs and other donated wheelchairs are refurbished by prisoners at Parkhurst prison before being shipped abroad. The charity is based in Salisbury but has offices in Epsom. The figure raised so far stands at £11,500 raised through sponsored events, concerts, the talent shows and lots of nice things to eat!

### **Three Cheers for Cheers! (Upper 4)**

This is an embryo charity founded by our very own Miss Gregory. "Three Cheers for Cheers!" is being established to make annual gifts of shopping tokens to adults in hospital over the Christmas period. The aim is to help alleviate poverty for some of the long term sick and just to let others know that someone is thinking of them. It is very much a local charity run for the benefit of local people. The Upper 4 have raised £1,585 so far.

### **Teenage Cancer Trust (Lower 5)**

The Teenage Cancer Trust is a charity which provides support for teenagers with cancer. From specialist units to better information, making teenagers more aware of cancer symptoms and providing support for sufferers, the remit of the Teenage Cancer Trust is very wide. It provides support to a section of the community that is not always well-catered for. Lower 5 have raised £1,450.

### **Rhianna's Fund (Upper 5)**

When a young Ashtead resident, Rhianna, was killed in a tragic accident, her family started Rhianna's Fund. It is a charity that supports vulnerable children in Africa and India. The charity is supporting a number of projects at the present time including working with orphaned children and renovating schools in Kampala. Upper 5 have raised £1,028.

### **Dyscover (Lower 6)**

Dyscover is another local charity which provides support, encouragement and hope to those with dysphasia. Dysphasia is the term given to speech problems which can develop after brain injury or illness. This charity supports both sufferers and their families and provides support, encouragement and practical therapies to help those affected come to terms with their condition. The Sixth Form have raised £2,370.
